

Mike's Story

I grew up in a family that didn't know Jesus, so when my girlfriend, Tiffani, started going to church again, I wasn't interested. In fact, we were already thinking of splitting up: we both had kids from previous relationships, so the stress of family life and parenting was getting to us, and I was ready to be done.

In the midst of all that tension, Tiffani's mom prayed for our relationship, and something in my heart opened up to the possibility of going to church. I figured it wouldn't hurt to give it a shot.

When I first came to Open Door at the start of 2023, I felt pretty on edge. My only other two church experiences were negative; I found myself waiting for the moment when the pastor said something hateful or the congregation acted strange, but that moment never came. In fact, the sermon series at the time was titled Discipling the Next Generation, all about parenting, which was exactly what I needed, so we started to go every Sunday as a family, but I still didn't know Jesus.

Leading up to Easter, we attended the Passover Experience, which was a traditional seder meal that laid out the gospel, and then I participated in the Good Friday service where I physically nailed my written-out sins onto the cross. But all these things didn't come together until Easter Sunday, when I had an epiphany regarding what I had been hearing over the weekend. My eyes finally opened to the truth: I was broken, but God loved me too much to let me stay that way. He wanted to heal my brokenness and make me more like Him. When I woke up the next morning, the world was brighter, and a weight was off my shoulders.



I finally had hope.

The week after Easter,
Open Door started
an Alpha class—a
discussion-based
exploration of the basics
of Christian belief—
and I was a brand-new
Christian hungry to learn
about this faith I knew
very little about. My table
leader, Andrew Holland,



kept bringing up Discipleship Intensive Groups (DIGs), so after Alpha, I dove into the deep end and joined one.

For nearly two years, we met as a small group of guys just about every week and went through the *Discipleship Essentials* book, which breaks down the way that we see Jesus doing discipleship in the Gospels. This consistent step of accountability and studying the Bible alongside other men helped me to grow like crazy. I kept taking steps in my discipleship journey by joining the Everyman Challenge, serving at church, and leading my own DIG. After all, we're called to be disciples who make disciples!

Over the last two years, our lives have completely changed. Tiffani and I got married and had a baby together, my son and I got baptized, and we're in a LifeGroup that bears each other's burdens. Our family is following Jesus together.

Being a Christian doesn't make life easy, but it offers us a hope that we just didn't have before. I want my life to be about discipling the next generation of Christians—and I've realized that isn't limited to kids. I was born again at the age of 30. Another person might be born again at the age of 80. It doesn't matter when it happens; what matters is that we start fresh and then grow to become more like Christ.



UTURIAS STOR

If I'm being honest, back in 2023, my life sucked. I hated my toxic work environment, I was stressed all the time, and I was feeling bitter about how my life had gone up to this point. After a tough childhood, my adulthood had continued to be haunted by my past, and while I was doing my best to provide for my son, we were really just getting by. In the mornings, I'd wake up angry, and in the evenings, I'd go to bed angry.

That summer, we went to a community barbecue, and a guy named Shamar invited us to Church of the Open Door. I decided to attend here and there over the next few months. Mind you, I had gone to church a few times when I was younger, but I had found it boring and had counted down the minutes until I could leave. Still, with life sucking so much, I thought a bit of God couldn't hurt.

Little did I know that God doesn't just do "a bit." He comes in and changes everything.

That December, my mom got diagnosed with lung cancer after being a lifelong smoker, which was really hard. After that, I started going to church every Wednesday night. When my work schedule changed, I started to show up on Sundays, too.

Gradually, with every Bible-based sermon, God was working on my heart. See, I had been smoking weed every day and drinking with my friends and listening to bad music, but he started removing my desires for those things and replaced it with a hunger for Him. I even quit smoking cold-turkey in May of 2024 because I didn't want to wind up like my mom in 20 years. God gave me the strength to do that.

I experienced so much loss during that season. My mom passed away in November, and my best friend passed a few months later. But God still showed up in the midst of that loneliness and provided for me in so many ways.

I could tell countless stories: He gave me the opportunity to visit my mom in West Virginia before her health turned sour; He provided a car when mine started having issues; He enabled me to switch to a healthier job so that I could have a Sabbath; He helped my son get into Open Door Christian Schools so that he could get a Christian education; and, when I didn't think I'd have enough money to go on the missions trip to the Dominican Republic, he provided every last cent in the span of a single evening.

All the while, I was taking more and more steps of surrender. I started to serve as a greeter on Sundays and as a leader in Student Ministry, and I joined a LifeGroup and began to read God's Word daily. Prayer has played a huge role in all of this, too, to the point where I've set aside my own "War Room" where I can do battle on my knees while I commune with God and pray for others.

I've realized that things happen for a reason, and in the moment, you don't understand God's purpose and planbut then, when it's behind you, you see His hands all over it. If you had told me a few years ago where I'd be today, I wouldn't have believed you. Though I went through what I went through, I wouldn't change my life for nothing. Things happen for a reason. We might not understand it at that time, and maybe we'll never understand, but God uses all of it. All of the suffering, He can redeem.



CHRIS'S STORY

When our Avon Lake Campus Pastor, Charlie Miller, mentioned that he felt it was time for me to get connected with the Everyman Challenge, my first reaction was not exactly one of great enthusiasm. The Everyman Challenge, as Charlie explained, is a discipleship ministry designed to help men grow in their faith and integrity and be challenged spiritually alongside a brotherhood of other men. It's a group meant to hold you accountable and encourage you. Still, my initial thought was something like, Oh, great! Another program that stirs you for a moment but then fades away once the emotion passes.

Being retired, I also felt a different kind of resistance—more along the lines of, Can't you just let me grow old gracefully? But somehow, I felt the Lord tugging at me, and so, somewhat reluctantly, I agreed to participate. Looking back now, I am so glad I did. The experience was far more rewarding than I ever imagined, not simply because of how it made me feel, but because of what I witnessed God doing among a group of ordinary men. The Everyman Challenge allowed me to see firsthand how God is awakening in men a deep desire to be faithful servant leaders: men who lead

by example, by openness, and by vulnerability. Each week, as stories and testimonies were shared, I could see how the Lord was shaping lives, calling us to greater faithfulness and courage. It was a reminder that God doesn't wait for the perfect person to accomplish His purposes. He uses imperfect, everyday people, just as He did with the original twelve disciples.

And did I mention it was actually fun? There was plenty of laughter, brotherhood, and even some good-natured teasing, but underneath it all was a real sense of purpose and spiritual growth.

Another meaningful opportunity to serve came when Charlie asked if I would consider co-leading a four-week class with him on how to have *good-faith conversations* with people who might be skeptical of Christianity. The course was grounded in basic Christian apologetics and designed to help believers engage others with both truth and grace. Charlie knew my interest in apologetics and thoughtful dialogue, so he invited me to help develop and teach the sessions.

I appreciated the opportunity to be able to use the gifts that God has given me for the Kingdom, but while I was excited, I won't pretend I wasn't nervous. I brought that fear and trembling before the Lord. I trusted Him, and in the end, the class went so well that we're planning to do it again in the future.

I am deeply grateful for these opportunities and for how God continues to shape me even in this season of life. Being part of Open Door's Avon Lake Campus has been an incredible blessing. Week after week, I get to witness faith lived out authentically by humble men and women who serve the Lord wholeheartedly. It is both inspiring and humbling to be part of a community where God is clearly at work.



- Since January 2020, homelessness among Ohio children and families has surged by over 10%.
- Families without the stability of a home are locked in perpetual survival mode, making it nearly impossible to recover. Generation House meets people in that gap and helps them back on their feet.

Eight years ago, Pat fell into attending **Celebrate Recovery** by what felt like an accident—but really, God knew it was exactly what he needed.

"My granddaughters go to Open Door Christian Schools. I was there for a Christmas Concert when I happened to see a pamphlet about Celebrate Recovery in the lobby," he said. "I had just come out of a year's worth of counseling for a serious pornography addiction that had almost ruined my marriage of 38 years. I thought, you know what? I'm gonna give this a try."

Sharing with others how God had changed the direction of his heart and his life was profoundly healing and encouraging for Pat. Over the course of a year, he completed the 12-Step Program, which is like holding up a Biblical mirror to your life to work through hurts, habits, and hangups while in the context of a loving community. As soon as he was done, he turned around to start helping others go through the program as a group leader.

"I've come to Celebrate Recovery nearly every Thursday evening for the past eight years, and I see myself doing this for the rest of my life, as far as I'm concerned," Pat said. "We're all broken. If Jesus can do what He did for me, He can do it for others. And see, we're not there to fix each other—we're there to hold space for the work God is doing and provide support in these vulnerable situations."

Celebrate Recovery is a ministry designed for any person that needs to find freedom from an issue controlling their lives, be it addiction, insecurity, trauma, or mental health struggles. At every meeting, there is a time of worship, a lesson or an inspiring testimony, and a break into groups for a more intimate setting that facilitates trust and nurtures encouragement.

"If you're feeling intimidated, know that Celebrate Recovery is not some formal and scary thing," Pat said. "Just bring yourself and see what God will do. It's tender, not judgmental, and it helps to put your guard down and trust the Lord. Even if you think you're 'fixed,' you'll find that there's so much more God has in store for you."

At Open Door, we've been looking for ways we can make a tangible difference in people's lives. We've been praying about it, seeking the Lord's guidance, and listening to leaders in Lorain County to identify the most pressing needs. **The concern that kept coming up over and over again was that we have a**



mental health crisis in Lorain County. In response, and with the support of our boards and the input of local and industry experts, we plan to address this need by launching a new ministry in Downtown Elyria: Open Door Counseling & Community Center.

Our members approved a property purchase! We are eager to participate in God's work in Lorain County, and we ask that you continue to pray for the Lord's guidance in the process.

The Center will provide a space for licensed counseling and life-skill classes (such as personal budgeting, health & wellness, and entrepreneurship). Our mission will be to offer hope and healing to the Lorain County community by providing Christ-centered counseling and services rooted in biblical principles and clinical expertise.

DAKS StoRY

Ten years ago, I was the Student Ministry Director at the newly opened Vermilion Campus. I loved the church, but we were struggling financially. Our newborn son was extremely sick: he was having seizures, spent much of his first year in the hospital, and had to see four different specialists. The medical bills piled up until they weren't going to collections anymore. We were getting sued.

I needed to provide for my family, and ministry just didn't pay enough. The church kept me on staff as long as possible to help us through the transition, but I found a job as a corrections officer since working for the government would give us better medical insurance. But transitioning from ministry to a prison was intense in ways I wasn't prepared for.

I'd struggled with depression since high school. Doctors told me I had a chemical imbalance. Working in the prison made things worse. I wasn't the same man anymore. I turned to alcohol to deal with the stress and bitterness, which put a strain on my marriage.

Then, within just a few weeks, I was assaulted in the prison, my grandfather passed away, and I was assaulted again. The government put me on leave for six months, but it was unpaid, and we were at risk of losing the house. I worked odd jobs just to survive. Everything was falling apart—my job, my marriage, my family, my faith.

My wife kept taking the kids to church every Sunday, but I had stopped going. I was praying, but I felt like God wasn't listening. Why keep showing up when I felt abandoned by Him?

One Sunday in December 2019, my wife asked, yet again, "Are you going to church?" As always, I said no. **But** something about that day was different. God grabbed me by the shoulders and punched me in the mouth. I felt compelled to go. So, begrudgingly, I did. I came late and snuck into the back of the service. My wife didn't even know I was there.

Toward the end of the sermon, Pastor Jim said something I'll never forget: "Everything you pray for that God gives you, and doesn't give you, is a test of your faith."

At that moment, I realized I'd been asking God to take my problems away, but I had never truly given them to Him. So right there, I surrendered everything. I told Him, no matter how hard I work or how hard I try, I can't do this on my own.

And you know what? Everything changed.

Right after that service, a buddy called needing help with some paid work, and then the very next day, the state called to say they were back-paying me for all the time I'd been off. That was just the beginning of how God provided.

Now, six years
later, my life has
completely flipped.
God freed me from
depression and
opened up so many
opportunities. I
left the prison
and now work for
the Elyria Police
Department and



the Army. Because of those transitions, I've been able to help lead the Safety Team at Open Door, teach safety seminars with the county EMA, and train church staff, schools, and businesses on de-escalation in potentially dangerous situations.

I had felt imprisoned in my own brokenness, but God used all of it to break me down to the point where I'd finally trust Him. He had been working the entire time; I just couldn't see it.
